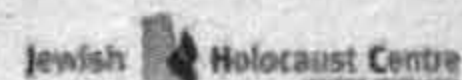

A call for tolerance

AN anti-discrimination activist has called for the Jewish community to show tolerance towards all people, including those who identify as gay, lesbian, bisexual or transgender (GLBT).

Gary Burns, a seasoned campaigner against discrimination, expressed his disappointment this week with some of the attitudes in the Jewish community towards the GLBT community.

“Orthodox rabbis, by comparing homosexuality to bestiality or incest via a public act, are committing unlawful vilification,” Burns said. “This comparison breaches the NSW Anti-Discrimination Act and its vilification provisions. It incites hatred against homosexuals and, as a message, is pernicious to the promotion

of tolerance and understanding for homosexuals.”

His comments were a response to a complaint from within the Victorian Jewish community about accusations of vilification by Orthodox rabbis.

“We, as Australians, all have a duty to work as one in the promotion of tolerance and understanding for all minority peoples,” Burns said.

Jewish Community Council of Victoria (JCCV) president John Searle echoed Burns and expressed his personal concern over accusations of vilification from Jewish individuals against the GLBT community.

Searle said the JCCV had worked hard in Victoria to encourage the government and police to toughen up on hate crimes. It has also been encouraging wide-spread inclusion

within the Jewish community.

“My executive has been particularly diligent in attempting to ensure representatives of all groups within the Jewish community are included in community and JCCV events. It is vital that all members of our community are made to feel welcome and that no sections of our community be excluded,” he said.

“We remain committed to ensuring channels of communication with members of our GLBT community remain open. We will continue to voice our concern with and disapproval of vilification of members of these groups, and other minority groups, and will continue to ensure that members of the GLBT groups within our community are invited to and feel welcome at our events,” Searle added.
